The First Lesson

Exodus 24:12-18

Antiracism Team Forum **TODAY at 5:30**

As the Antiracism Team of Grace Church, we seek a just society where all are unique and interconnected, one in Christ (Gal. 3: 28). As Dr. Martin Luther King said, “We are caught in an inescapable network of mutuality, tied in a single garment of destiny.” Yet just one week prior to the Church’s celebration of Absalom Jones – the first Black priest in the Episcopal Church, ordained in 1802 – racist depictions of former President Obama and his wife, Michelle, were posted online. These stereotypes dehumanize Black people and tear at the fabric of our faith. For white Christians, it recalls our complicity in the racial structuring of our society, and we cannot “stand idly by” (Lev. 19:16).

After the Celtic Service at 4:00 p.m. today, a Forum in the Common Room will offer a discussion of this racist depiction, as well as the recent letter signed by 154 Episcopal bishops calling for immigration policies respecting the dignity of all. In addition, time will be set aside for the signing of postcards containing an inclusive message to House as well as Senate committee chairs.

The Forum is open to all. In true Anglican style there will be tea and biscuits. Join us for worship at 4:00 p.m. and the Forum to follow.

Suggestions for Keeping a Holy Lent

Pray

Prayer is our conversation with God, spoken and unspoken; to pray is to place ourselves in God's presence. Some ways to pray:

- Attend church each Sunday in Lent.
- Attend an Ash Wednesday service and as many of the Holy Week services as you can.
- Say grace before meals.
- Pray one of the Daily Devotions for Individuals and Families from the prayer book (these are shortened forms of the Daily Office; you can find them at missionstclare.com).
- Set aside 5-10 minutes each day to sit quietly in God's presence.

Fast

To fast is to refrain from something for a time so that we clear space for a greater awareness of God. The absence of something can help us return our focus to God. Some ways to fast:

- Refrain from – or reduce your consumption of – meat, sugar, or caffeine, etc. Then, at Easter, make a donation to The Salem Pantry or another local hunger-relief organization.
- Fast from noise; schedule some time for silence each day, preferably at the same time so it's part of your routine.

- Do a “digital fast” – schedule time in which you do not use your digital devices. You might commit to a digital fast each evening, or for a day or two each week, etc.

Read

Spiritual reading can help recenter us and return our attention to our spiritual life. It also gives us something to reflect on throughout the day. Here are some suggestions:

- Read one of the gospels all the way through, a chapter each day. You might try reading Matthew’s gospel, since our Sunday gospel readings this year are mostly taken from Matthew.
- Read one or two psalms each day.
- Do some spiritual reading (e.g., a book of Lenten devotions; *Forward Day by Day*; a book on prayer or the spiritual life).
- Go to episcopalrelief.org/lent and sign up to receive a daily Lenten email from Episcopal Relief & Development, focused on the holy habits of prayer, worship, and engagement with Scripture.
- Reading can include taking a class – consider attending one of the classes offered at Grace during Lent: “Journeying with the Mystics” and “Episcopal 101,” as well as the monthly forum offered by our antiracism team on March 15.

Serve

Thomas Merton wrote, “Action is the stream, and contemplation is the spring.” Our life of prayer and worship flows naturally into service to others. Here are some ways to consider serving:

- Spend some time reflecting on your gifts and skills, and who might need them.
- If you’re seeking ways to volunteer, consider a local organization that helps people in need, such as Lifebridge, The Salem Pantry, etc.
- Make a donation to our diocese’s [Immigrant Legal Emergency Fund](#).
- Explore [Episcopal City Mission’s Emergent Action Network](#) to find resources for immigration and racial justice.

This Week's Feast: Thomas Bray

Thomas Bray was born at Marton, in Shropshire, England, in 1656. After graduating from Oxford and being ordained as a priest, he became a country parson in Warwickshire. In 1696 he was invited by the Bishop of London to be responsible for the oversight of church work in the colony of Maryland. Three years later, as the Bishop's Commissary, he sailed to the American colonies for his first, and only, visitation.

Though he spent only two and a half months in Maryland, Bray was deeply concerned about the neglected state of the American churches, and the great need for the education of clergy, laity, and children. At a general visitation of the clergy at Annapolis, before his return to England, he emphasized the need for the instruction of children, and insisted that no clergyman be given a charge unless he had a good report from the ship in which he crossed the Atlantic, "whether . . . he gave no matter of scandal, and whether he did constantly read prayers twice a day and catechize and preach on Sundays, which, notwithstanding the common excuses, I know can be done by a minister of any zeal for religion." His understanding of, and concern for, Native Americans and African Americans were far ahead of his time. He founded thirty-nine lending libraries in America, as well as numerous schools. He raised money for missionary work and influenced young English priests to go to America.

Bray tried hard to have a bishop consecrated for the American colonies, but failed. His greatest contributions were the founding of the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge and the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, both of which are still effectively in operation after two and a half centuries of work all over the world.

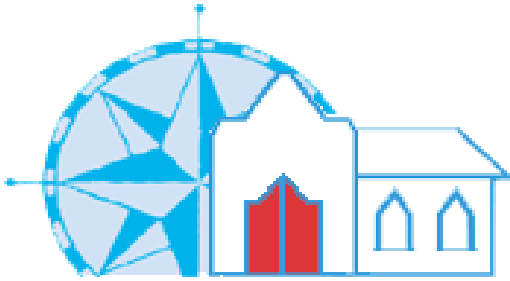
From 1706 to 1730, Bray was the rector of St. Botolph Without Aldgate in London, where, until his death there on February 15, 1730, at the age of 72, he served with energy and devotion, while continuing his efforts on behalf of Black slaves in America and in the founding of parochial libraries.

When the deplorable condition of English prisons was brought to Bray's attention, he set to work to influence public opinion and to raise funds to alleviate the misery of the inmates. He organized Sunday "Beef and Beer" dinners in prisons, and advanced proposals for prison reform. It was Thomas Bray who first suggested to General Oglethorpe the idea of founding a humanitarian colony for the relief of honest debtors, but he died before the Georgia colony became a reality. *From Lesser Feasts and Fasts, Church Publishing*
